Interim Rector's Report:

*Something's coming... I don't know...
what it is... but it is gonna be great!*

Those words from Leonard Bernstein's West Side Story are sung in anticipation that something's coming around the corner and it's what we've been looking for. Is it a new garden? Is it a new rector? Who knows? We just know that: "It's only just out of reach; Down the block, on a beach. Maybe tonight."

That something will be the end of the season of Lent and beginning of the season of Easter. Ordinarily most people think of Easter being one day – a day of celebration, hunting Easter eggs, eating ham and home cooked food. But it's actually a season in the church year –one of 50 days ending only at Pentecost on June 9.

In order to get to Easter we still have to get through Holy Week, one of the most spiritual times in Christianity. Please join us as we walk with Jesus through the week. We start with Palm Sunday – a day of joy at Jesus' arrival on a donkey and ended with sorrow at his crucifixion.

That is followed by the three days before Easter: Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Eve. Each one offers a look at the extraordinary challenges being faced by Jesus, and us, on the way to the cross.

On Maundy Thursday we will begin with dinner mirroring Jesus' last supper at 5:00 in the Parish Hall. A Eucharistic service will follow where there will be the traditional foot washing and stripping of the altar. If you have not attended before, it is a very emotional service that demonstrates our love for Jesus at a critical time of his life.

On Good Friday we will gather in empty churches and read the Gospel of Luke passage that covers these last days of Jesus' life. The day is also one of prayer for those around us who need it.

Finally we have Easter Vigil on the night before Easter where we remember the journey of how we got to be in this place. We light the new Easter candle and process to honor Christ's entry into our lives through his resurrection. There will be shorter readings and no incense to entice you to come back to this important service.

Just as we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus on April 20, we continue the joy that we feel on that Easter Day, April 21, when the women come to the tomb where Jesus was laid and find nothing. Christ the Lord is risen today! Alleluia!

So please join us in all the services around Easter Day. "Something's coming" and you don't want to miss it because it will truly be great!

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Spiritual Reflections by Mother Eunice

Meditation is a way of slowing down so as to descend into the depths of yourself in the present moment, where God lies waiting to grant you a deep experience of your eternal oneness with God. – James Finley

As I write this article we are in the tail end of Lent, a season of spiritual disciplines old and new to prepare for what we call the Paschal Feast, i.e. the feast day of the Resurrection. To be honest, I never thought I would be called to the practice of a contemplative life, a life devoted to prayer, meditation and contemplation. I, who was always in trouble for laughing in church as a child in choir, and sometimes even today! Yet here I am with a strong private practice of meditation in my prayer room at home, facilitating a meditation group at All Saints on Wednesday afternoons, and participating in other local meditation groups.

I must say, I have to laugh from time to time because I know in my heart that this is the path God has called me to follow; to be a contemplative follower of Christ in spite of myself. Where some are very social justice oriented followers of Christ participating in protests, working on community boards and committees etc., I tend to be one who enjoys quietly working behind the scenes, devoting myself to God in prayer and meditation for myself and others. I have, therefore, often described myself as more of a chaplain or monastic priest where my ministry is predominantly to those who are home-bound, in hospitals or nursing homes. And this irony has not been missed by one of my teachers, Cynthia Bourgeault, who can tell you how in the early 1990s how unreceptive I was to that kind of practice of quiet and stillness. And yet here I am today. The Holy Spirit really can work with and through anyone who just keeps showing up! And that really does seem to be all that is required, a commitment to just showing up. No need to be perfect and no need to know all the scriptures. All you need is the desire for a deeper relationship with God, the willingness to take time to be still and you will have it.

You may be happy with your current Lenten discipline this year, but if you happen to be wondering how to get closer to God for the long haul, all you need to do is listed in the 11th verse of Psalm 46 "Be still and know that I am God." And if you feel so inclined, come and join us on Wednesdays in the chapel at All Saints at 2pm and soak up some quality time with God.

Happy Lent (?) Maybe a better greeting would be “A blessed lent to you all.” Either way, I do hope your journey through this year’s Lenten season has been one of blessing in some way. The season of Lent is a time when I often hear grumbling about “doom and gloom” or self-denial, or a whole host of other dour aspects. Many times from many folks giving up is bandied about, be it sweets, or that morning latte, or even “I’m giving up LENT for Lent!” Of COURSE Lent would be a negative time with all of these negative aspects!

I often hear, too, about the dark and gloomy nature of the music of Lent. This year, however, as I was looking over the selections for services for the remainder of the season, I have been heartened by the variety of messages contained within the hymns and anthems. Messages of self-reflection are there, yes, but so are messages of hope and nearness to God. In fact, the anthem for March 31 was a beautiful and serene setting of the timeless hymn “Nearer, My God, to Thee.” We have also joined in singing hymns with outright praise, guidance, and love as their topics, such as “The God of Abraham Praise,” “O Bless the Lord, My Soul,” “Guide Me, O Thou Great Jehovah,” and “My Jesus, I Love Thee.” Personally, I see Lent as a time to draw close to God, and to remember Jesus’ time in the desert, and what he may have thought while there. Fasting for forty days may very well have led him to draw close to God, as well, maybe to rely on God’s steadfast love to get him through that time.

As always, the scripture is the first inspiration for the music we join together to sing, and to lift our prayers heavenward. Throughout Lent thus far, we have read and heard themes of faithfulness, love, the promise of faith, God’s saving grace to those who call out, and others, and through this season, Jesus’ time of fasting and prayer in the desert inspires us to look at ourselves, not for guilt-ridden, shame-inducing denial, but to check in with ourselves and our place in whatever is our station. A great way, always, to traverse this time is by joining together in our corporate worship and song, for as St. Augustine said, “He who prays sings twice.” Our singing, our music, indeed our worship, to quote Fr. Russ Bohner of St. Anne’s Middletown, “...should be the best thing we do all week.” I agree. It

should set the stage for what we do during the week from Sunday to Sunday. Our whole hearts, minds, and spirits should be poured into our worship, where together we offer the best of ourselves in glory and praise to God, just as Jesus spent forty days in the desert in fasting and prayer, that he might be in communion with God.

I look forward to seeing you on Sunday, where I hope you will join with everyone gathered to offer YOUR best to God and to your neighbor. Come with new eyes and new ears to see and hear in new ways the messages contained in the scripture and the songs. It is my hope that your added voice transforms the words and songs in an even newer way,

Susan's Short Sharings by Deacon Susan Phillips

Dorothy Sayers writes that to make the Easter story into something that neither startles, shocks, terrifies, nor excites is "to crucify the Son of God afresh."

Certainly that would have been unthinkable for Jesus' first followers, who experienced it first hand: the heady excitement of his entry into Jerusalem, the traitorous cunning of Judas and the guilty recognition of their cowardice, the terror of his slow suffocation, and finally the disarming wonder of an empty grave and a living body resurrected from the dead.

As for us, his latter-day disciples, few would deny the magnitude or drama of these events. But how many of us embrace their pain and promise? How many of us, even at Easter, give Christ's death and resurrection any more attention than the weather?

To observe Lent is to strike at the root of such complacency. Lent (literally "springtime") is a time of preparation and even joy. The traditional self-sacrifices of Lent serve no purpose unless we are able to focus on our heart's deepest longing: unity with Christ. In him - in his suffering and death, his resurrection and triumph - we find our truest joy.

Who Moved My Cheese?

Do you remember the book? Many of you have read the book and will recall it is about dealing with change. We deal with a great deal of change at the thrift store on a daily basis, so I can relate to the book. Some of our recent changes include, once again new roof leaks, revamping the furniture side double door so both sides open making it easier to move furniture, building a wall in front of all of the rain water containers so they are not such an eyesore, adding more clothing racks on the walls, and of course the big change someday when we eventually find a new location.

Almost everyone has a favorite teacher. A favorite teacher of mine always said: Leaders are Readers! So I try to read a little about leadership, strong organizations, team building, improving performance and issues that will help us at the Thrift Store. From time to time I think of this book, *Who Moved My Cheese*, and smile. The book was a bestseller by DR Spencer Johnson that uses a parable format about four mice who live in a "Maze" and look for "Cheese" to nourish them and make them happy. He uses Cheese as a metaphor for what you want to have in life. It may be doing well in school, developing a strong team, making a difference, or just feeling good about yourself. And the Maze is where you look for what you want.

In the story, the mice are faced with unexpected change. Where they usually find cheese but is now gone. But they keep looking in the same place with no success. Eventually, one of them deals with it successfully, and writes what he has learned on the Maze walls. When you see "The Handwriting on the wall," you can discover for yourself how to deal with change. Then you can overcome your fears and see change as a way of achieving something better.

People take different things from the book. It is a great book to help deal with change. There are ideas about teamwork, organizational leadership, communications, flexibility, and caring for one another. To me, it pointed out how important it is to keep everyone informed about change. The mice did not always agree about the decisions, they just wanted to be part of the discussions. They wanted to feel valued by being part of something bigger than themselves. When they were not included in the conversations, they thought no one cared about them. Since it appeared that people did not care, they did not feel valued, and it was harder and harder to keep looking for "Cheese!" We clearly understand their feelings here at the Thrift Store and how important it is to be a part of the effort to realize the church mission. No mouse wants to be left out! All the mice feel valued when they have a part in the discussions. Since the changes would dramatically impact their efforts, they wanted a seat at the table. Every mouse is important!

On the decision making continuum, consensus is the highest form of decision making. It is also the most challenging to achieve. It requires a great deal of leadership to listen carefully to everyone, consider their opinions, value their contributions and have patience. Voting is the easier form of decision making and it just requires some form of majority. High functioning organizations make efforts to make decisions closest to the point of impact. Mice in the Maze at the very least want to understand the handwriting on the wall and how it will impact them.

If you have not read this book, check it out. It is an easy read! No matter what parts of the book hits home for you, it becomes clear that we all have something in common: Successful organizations value and consider every single mouse, and we all need to find our way in the Maze and succeed in changing times. Every one of us needs to deal with: *Who Moved My Cheese?*

The Rector Search Committee will then meet in April with the Vestry, David Miron (from the Samaritan Center in Pennsylvania) and our consultant, Mimi Delcuze, to analyze and interpret the results of the CAT. Thereafter, we will hold two church-wide meetings in May -- one for St. George's Chapel and one for All Saints' Church -- to share the results and to facilitate a full and open discussion. Then we will be in a position to prepare the portrait of the parish that we need in order to move forward with our search for a new rector. Remember, your comments and suggestions are always welcome at any point during this process.

2019 IRA Charitable Rollover

HAVE YOU TAKEN YOUR REQUIRED MINIMUM DISTRIBUTION (RMD) FOR 2019?

If you are 70 ½ or older, you can make a contribution to All Saints' Church or St. George's Chapel directly from your Traditional IRA simply by instructing the plan administrator to make the transfer directly to All Saints' Church or St. George's Chapel as a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD). You are allowed to transfer up to \$100,000 a year to the charities of your choice.

Your gift will be transferred directly to All Saints' Church or St. George's Chapel, will not be reported as taxable income and will count toward your minimal distribution requirements for 2019.

And, most important, your generous support will help sustain your Church's work by bringing about transformation, renewal, and positive change in our community.

St. George's ECW

The Victory Garden Project is a collaborative effort between St. George's Chapel ECW, parishioners and Crisis House homeless shelter in Georgetown where the garden is being developed. The project is being chaired by Carol Wells, a St. George's ECW member who has been working with Crisis House executive director, Marie Marole and the Lewes Community Garden Club in early planning. Start up details are underway with an enthusiastic planning committee and over \$3,200 has been raised so far. However, most of the initial funds have been used for fencing, soil, and supplies for raised beds. In order for the project to continue, the committee is seeking help in receiving additional monetary donations which could be sent to the parish office. Carol hopes this project will start a trend at shelters and other churches in working together in growing food, taking pride in caring for gardens and finally enjoying the harvest of their efforts. 
